#### 2010 PROPOSED AMENDMENTS GREENE LAND USE ORDINANCE

Note: These proposed amendments are to address comments on Shoreland Zoning Standards adopted at the 2009 Town Meeting, contained in a letter dated April 30, 2009 from the Commissioner of the Maine Department of Environmental Protection.

Amend Section 1-101.4. B., Repeal of Municipal Timber Harvesting Regulation as follows:

B. Repeal of Municipal Timber Harvesting Regulation.

The municipal regulation of timber harvesting activities is repealed on the statutory date established under 38 M.R.S.A. section 438- $\mathbf{A}$   $\mathbf{B}$ (5), at which time the State of Maine Department of Conservation's Bureau of Forestry shall administer timber harvesting standards in the shoreland zone. On the date established under 38 M.R.S.A section 438- $\mathbf{A}$   $\mathbf{B}$ (5), the following provisions of this Ordinance are repealed:

Amend Section 1-101, General, by adding a Section 1-101.7 as follows:

1-101.7 Conflicts with Other Ordinances.

Whenever a provision of this Ordinance conflicts with or is inconsistent with another provision of this Ordinance or of any other ordinance, regulation or statute administered by the municipality, the more restrictive provision shall control.

Amend Section 2-101.3. B., Nonconforming structures as follows:

B. A non-conforming structure, <u>not located in the shoreland zone</u>, which is removed or damaged or destroyed by fire, lightning, wind or other natural disasters may be rebuilt in place provided that construction is commenced within one (1) year from the date of removal, damage or destruction and that the non-conformities are not further increased.

Amend Section 2-101.3. C.1.d, Nonconforming structures as follows:

d. For structures located less than 100 feet, horizontal distance, from the normal highwater line of a great pond classified as GPA or a river flowing to a great pond classified as GPA, the maximum combined total floor area for all portions of those structures within that 100-foot distance is 1,500 square feet, and the maximum height of any portion of a structure that is within 100 feet, horizontal distance, of a great pond is 25 feet or the height of the existing structure, whichever is greater, except that any portion of those structures located less than 75 feet, horizontal distance, from the normal high-water line of a water body, tributary stream, or the upland edge of a wetland must meet the floor area and height limits of 3 above.

For the purposes of subparagraph a 1, a basement is not counted toward floor area.

Amendment Section 3-101.2.E.8.a., Resource Protection District, as follows:

Made in standard and a standard and

a. Areas within 250 feet, horizontal distance, of the upland edge of freshwater wetlands, or wetlands associated with great ponds and rivers, which are rated "moderate" or "high" value waterfowl and wading bird habitat, including nesting areas by the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (MDIF&W) that are depicted on a Geographic Information System (GIS) data layer maintained by either MDIF&W or the Department as of December 31, 2008. For the purposed of this paragraph "wetlands associated with great ponds and rivers" shall mean areas characterized by non-forested wetland vegetation and hydric soils that are contiguous with a great pond or river, and have a surface elevation at or below that water level of the great pond or river during the period of normal high water. "Wetlands associated with great ponds or rivers" are considered to be part of that great pond or river.

## Amend Section 3-101.21.G.1.b, Timber Harvesting, as follows:

b. Beyond the 75-foot strip referred to in paragraph a above, timber harvesting is permitted in accordance with paragraph b below except that in no case shall the average residual basal area of trees over 4 1/2 inches in diameter at 4X2 4 1/2 feet above ground level be reduced to less than 30 square feet per acre.

## Amend Section 3-101.21.G.2.a. Timber Harvesting, as follows:

a. Selective cutting of no more than forty (40) percent of the total volume of trees four (4) inches or more in diameter measured at 4 1/2 feet above ground level on any lot in any ten (10) year period is permitted. (See subsection 6. 3 of this section for an exception to the 40 percent standard.) In addition:

# Amend Section 3-101.21.H.2.b., Clearing or Removal of Vegetation for Activities Other Than Timber Harvesting, as follows:

b. Selective cutting of trees within the buffer strip is allowed provided that a well-distributed stand of trees and other natural vegetation is maintained. For the purposes of <u>this</u> section a "well-distributed stand of trees" adjacent to a great pond classified GPA or a river or stream flowing to a great pond classified GPA, shall be defined as maintaining a rating score of 24 or more in each 25- foot by 50-foot rectangular (1250 square feet) area as determined by the following rating system.

## Amend Section 3-101.21.R.1., Mineral Exploration and Extraction, as follows:

A reclamation plan shall be filed with, and approved by the Planning Board before a
permit is granted. Such plan shall describe in detail procedures to be undertaken to
fulfill the requirements of paragraph 4 <u>3</u> below.

#### Amend Section 12-101.2, Definitions as follows:

INDIVIDUAL PRIVATE CAMPSITE- An area of land which is not associated with a campground, but which is developed for repeated camping by only one group not to exceed ten (10) individuals and which involves site improvements which may include but not be limited to <u>a</u> gravel pads, parking areas, fire places, or tent platforms.

VOLUME OF A STRUCTURE- the volume of all portions of a structure enclosed by roof and fixed exterior walls as measured from the exterior faces of these walls and roof.

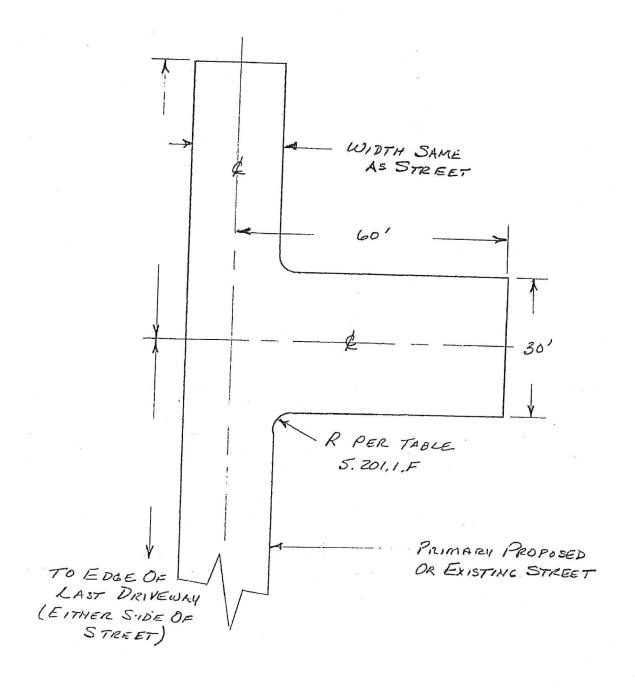
Dead End Streets: In addition to the design standards above, dead-end streets shall be H. constructed to provide a cul-de-sac turnaround with the following requirements for radii. Property line sixty five (65) feet, outer edge of pavement fifty (50) feet. A The use of a hammer-head (also called a T or L) turnaround may be permitted as an alternative to a culde-sac turnaround where, in the opinion of the Planning Board, such a turnaround may provide for improved environmental protection, future extension of the street, future connection to another subdivision or subdivision expansion, or access to common land or facilities. In the case of a hammer-head turnaround, the street shall extend 125 feet beyond the furthest edge of the last driveway with a travel way width equal to that of the street. The centerline of the hammerhead or L portion of the turnaround shall be located 65 feet beyond the furthest edge of the last driveway and 60 feet from the end of the street. The width of the travel way of the hammerhead (L portion of the turnaround) shall be thirty (30) feet wide and the hammerhead shall be sixty (60) feet long/measured from the center line of the abutting street. and shall be located at least 50 feet from the end of the travel way. (See sketch at end of Chapter). The width of the Right of Way for the hammerhead portion of the turnaround shall be 60 feet, minimum.

The Board may require the reservation of a twenty (20) foot an easement, the width of which will be determined by the Planning Board but no wider than sixty (60) feet, in line with the street or the hammerhead to provide continuation of the street, connection with another existing or potential future street, pedestrian traffic, or utilities or to provide access to trails or common land. to the next street.

The Board may also require the reservation of a sixty (60)foot easement in line with the street to provide continuation of the street where future subdivision is possible.

Areas within 250 feet, horizontal distance, of the upland edge of freshwater wetlands, or wetlands associated with great ponds and rivers, which are rated "moderate" or "high" value waterfowl and wading bird habitat, including nesting areas by the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife (MDIF&W) that are depicted on a Geographic Information System (GIS) data layer maintained by either MDIF&W or the Department as of December 31, 2008. For the purposed of this paragraph "wetlands associated with great ponds and rivers" shall mean areas characterized by non-forested wetland vegetation and hydric soils that are contiguous with a great pond or river, and have a surface elevation at or below that water level of the great pond or river during the period of normal high water. "Wetlands associated with great ponds or rivers" are considered to be part of that great pond or river.

H. Dead End Streets: In addition to the design standards above, dead-end streets shall be constructed to provide a cul-de-sac turnaround with the following requirements for radii. Property line sixty five (65) feet; outer edge of pavement fifty (50) feet. A The use of a hammer-head (also called a T or L) turnaround may be permitted as an alternative to a cul-de-sac turnaround where, in the opinion of the Planning Board, such a turnaround may provide for improved environmental protection, future extension of the street, future

connection to another subdivision or subdivision expansion, or access to common land or facilities. In the case of a hammer-head turnaround, the street shall extend 125 feet beyond the furthest edge of the last driveway with a travel way width equal to that of the street. The centerline of the hammerhead or L portion of the turnaround shall be located 65 feet beyond the furthest edge of the last driveway and 60 feet from the end of the street. The width of the travel way of the hammerhead (L portion of the turnaround) shall be thirty (30) feet wide and the hammerhead shall be sixty (60) feet long/measured from the center line of the abutting street. and shall be located at least 50 feet from the end of the travel way. (See sketch at end of Chapter). The width of the Right of Way for the hammerhead portion of the turnaround shall be 60 feet, minimum.

The Board may require the reservation of a twenty (20) foot an easement, the width of which will be determined by the Planning Board but no wider than sixty (60) feet, in line with the street or the hammerhead to provide continuation of the street, connection with another existing or potential future street, pedestrian traffic, or utilities or to provide access to trails or common land. to the next street.

The Board may also require the reservation of a sixty (60)foot easement in line with the street to provide continuation of the street where future subdivision is possible.
